Dear WFWP Leaders, Members, Sponsors and Friends,

On behalf of our Co-founder Dr. Hak Ja Han Moon and all of us at WFWP IHQ, we would like to extend our warm greetings to you, your family and your community.

As we begin this new year 2023, we would like to take this opportunity to thank all of our leaders and members who despite facing great obstacles and challenges in their daily lives this year, never gave up and moved forward with unwavering support, dedication and positive spirit to create a better world for the next generation.

The year 2022 marked the 30th anniversary of our organization and ceremonies were held in various countries throughout the year. It was a year to recall our past accomplishments and rededicate our determinations for the next 30 years. It was dynamic and tumultuous, with new discoveries made. We look back at 2022 with gratitude and pride for how WFWPI contributed to WFWP's global chapters and partners:

- The Giving for Good International Project raised over US\$7,200, which will fund Climate Action Projects in various countries.
- Supported 3rd Funding Project (US \$28,000) for national projects to develop and support local activities.

- Raised funds to support Ukrainian families in need.
- Conducted more than 100 education and training webinar programs in each of the 11 WFWP regions to empower women and youth.
- Maximized IT-based operations to support regional and national chapters in communication, fundraising and administration.
- Created and developed more new and innovative educational projects with Young Professionals across the country, including webinars with youth leaders from various backgrounds and professions.
- Hosted a series of free virtual educational courses on financial planning and budgeting, social network management, emoji creation, NFTs and NGOs and heart intelligence to advance women's empowerment by providing a space for self-development and skill recognition.
- Published the WFWPI 30th-Anniversary book, a 560-page commemorative issue.
- Created a variety of awards on the international level, including the "Global Women Peace Ambassador Award" and the "Outstanding Volunteer Award" in recognition of the work and contributions of our partners and volunteers.
- Conducted five IAFLP webinars in association with UPF, including "No Peace Without Women" in collaboration with UN Women, NGO Committee on the Status of Women in Geneva, Rene Moawad Foundation and Soroptimist International.
- Conducted environmental projects in Kenya and South Africa, including the Green Solar Energy for the African villages, providing 33 families with solar lamps; and the Mobile Library project, an effort to reduce rural illiteracy and create a foundation for expanding early childhood education by bringing books into the world of children.
- Hosted the Global Women Peace Network Assembly in Asia Pacific 2 and Korea, focusing on the leadership of the heart and transformational leadership for existing and new generations of leaders.
- Conducted the 27th Women's Conference for Peace in the Middle East with the theme "Youth Education for a Future of Peace and Prosperity in the MENA" featuring the inauguration of the cultural center and library for the Afghan community living in India.
- Presented an advisory comment to TICAD (Tokyo International Conference on African Development) 8 Multi-sectoral dialogue hosted by the Ministry of Foreign Affairs of Japan and UNDP.

- Conducted the DMZ Peace Zone International Symposium in cooperation with speakers from Korea, Europe and the USA to discuss the value, future and peace vision of the DMZ through foreign dispute cases and implications.
- Hosted a bimonthly “WFWPI Virtual Cafe” and “Global Committee meetings” as international casual networking platforms for women leaders and members to interact and empower one another.
- Continued a virtual internship program to provide opportunities for interns to experience the work of WFWP and provide more support for local chapters that do not yet have internship programs.
- Conducted the international children’s art contest project “Color My Heart with Peace” to foster the hope of peace among youth through self-expression and self-development; and created a virtual metaverse WFWP space to expand the vision of peace to the younger generation.
- Contributed \$40,000 to the Permaculture Literacy Program in the Philippines.

WFWPI would not be where we are today without you.

In this year of 2023, we look forward to continue working with you as we strive towards our mutual goal of realizing one global family rooted in a culture of sustainable peace.

WFWP GLOBAL DEVELOPMENT AID

Since 2021, the WFWPI HQ decided to consolidate its international and domestic humanitarian aid projects under one umbrella and brand name “WFWP Global Development and Aid” worldwide. With the new name of the humanitarian project, WFWPI believes that the organization will develop its brand to a new level and continue to provide the best services and support to people in all parts of the world.

WHERE WE WORK



WOMEN'S EMPOWERMENT

The ratio of men to women in the world population is almost 50:50. However, when looking at the number of national legislators, who represent the nations, men outnumber women in most of the world's countries.

In March 2021, the World Economic Forum (WEF) released the Gender Gap Index, a ranking of the degree of gender equality in countries around the world. The index quantifies and ranks the overall gender gap in the four quadrants of "politics," "economy," "education," and "health," as well as 14 items in each country. The WEF notes that the time it will take for the world as a whole to reach gender equality has increased from "99.5 years" in 2020 to "135.6 years" in 2021 due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

WFWP continues to support and strive to help women become empowered and independent through literacy, self-development education, microcredit projects and women's health support.



Survival Skills Training in Botswana.

WFP Botswana held a Survival Skills Training to teach women tailoring skills.

85% of the women trained have obtained employment and are financially stable.

Financial Assistance to Women in Agriculture in Nigeria.

Since 2020, WFP Nigeria has been working to empower women by funding women-led entrepreneurship and providing agricultural tools, fertilizers and seeds.

Since 2020, the number of women becoming self-reliant in the Enugu, Akwa Ibom, Cross River, and Nasarawa states have increased to **52%** thanks to Nigeria’s WFP project.

Girl Child Empowerment Program in Burkina Faso.

WFP Burkina Faso project reduces early pregnancy and school dropout rates among girls and encourages them to have a vision for their own lives to increase their self-esteem.

942 girls participated in the Girl Empowerment Program, and **87%** of them reported that they “got their dream in life” after completing the program.

Pasifika Scholarship Fund in Australia.

The Pacific Island Scholarship Fund is a not-for-profit development program launched in March 2017. The scholarships aim to provide young adults living in the Pacific Islands with opportunities to access empowering education programs in their own country.

The program supports young people who are passionate about getting an education and who align their hearts with one of the values and goals of WFP: “Living for the sake of others.”

In 2022, WFP Australia was able to financially support **2** women throughout the year through the Fund to complete their university education.

In 2022, WFP Australia facilitated 15 young women to be mentored in the leadership of the heart. More than **90%** gained greater empowerment and connection.



Women’s Empowerment through Educational Programs in Korea.



4,913 women who attended the 2 symposiums, 3 webinars, 5 literature cafes, 1 forum, and 1 rally were educated and empowered, especially on the topic of sustainable peace and realization of reunification on the Korean peninsula.

Participants’ Voices:

“It’s like a dream to hear about this huge DMZ project in a short time, but it’s a big vision and a hopeful message for future generations to start preparing for inter-Korean reunification. And through further discussions, I want to gather each other’s thoughts and find small things that I can individually practice in my daily life for sustainable peace on the Korean Peninsula.”



Women's Empowerment through Educational Programs in the USA.

Through empowerment and educational programs held in the year 2022, WFWP USA was able to reach **4,328** women and members.

We attained **1578** through Peripheral Education: TV, Radio, Social Media, sharing Mother of Peace, National Prayer Calls for Peace and local Interfaith Prayer Circles.

Through social media outreach, **5,331** people were reached!

WFWPI Webinar on Women Entrepreneurship.

Self-employment has been blossoming over the past decade. In the webinar, WFWP introduces women entrepreneurs who evaluated their ideas for a successful business. Panelists present their best practice successes and the decision-making processes that have contributed to effectively tackling the enormous crisis in their diverse areas of responsibility.



Spring Awakening: Fundraising and Wellness Campaign.

Every year the WFWPI Office in NY raises funds for their office's projects and programs. This year, with a team of very talented interns, the office made the effort more fun, dynamic, uplifting and beneficial for our audience. The theme of our fundraising campaign was "Peace, Women & Environment: Action Toward New Beginnings" and the effort consisted of a GoFundMe, a special 3-day wellness program and an art book. Women and the environment have often been closely linked, based on similarities in their nature to nurture. To explore that link, we invited women from various fields to speak and lead workshops for a 3-Day Virtual session titled "Spring Awakening" in March 2022. The sessions explored the topics of peace, well-being and the environment and featured wellness activities such as yoga, sustainable fashion and healthy cooking.

• With this event, the office aimed to cultivate a sense of community and collective action, in awakening new mindfulness towards healing the Earth and empowering women, while also raising funds for the office through a donation-based registration and promotion of the GoFundMe page which collectively raised **\$4,037.11**.

• The office interns worked hard to design the first ever art book titled "Peace, Women & Environment: Action Toward New Beginnings," which featured overviews of the WFWPI office areas of focus - Bridging Divides, Raising Young Leaders and Women's Leadership and the Environment - and stories from the Giving For Good climate action projects. The book raised funds through sponsorships, raising a total of **\$23,308.55**.



CSW66 Virtual Parallel Event.

During the 66th Session of the United Nations Commission on the Status of Women (CSW66), WFWPI and WFWP Korea co-organized a Virtual Parallel Event, “Building Bridges: Fostering Mutual Empowerment Through Environmental Healing.” The world knows that we need to work together, yet we find it difficult to overcome fundamental differences in worldviews and values. Through storytelling and interactive dialogue, WFWPI and WFWP Korea aimed to create a space that encouraged the exploration of how we as women and girls can be empowered by leading the way in transcending obstacles of self-interest and fostering relationships of trust for the sake of a mutual goal of environmental healing in our communities. The climate crisis is increasingly affecting all communities around the world and WFWPI envisioned the space as an opportunity to build bridges between the government and civil society, men and women, as well as between people and nature.




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
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YOUTH EDUCATION AND EMPOWERMENT

According to UNICEF, the COVID-19 pandemic kept more than 168 million children worldwide out of school for about a year, from March 2020 to February 2021. Not all children have access to online classes because some do not have a computer or telecommunications environment. In Africa, where development is particularly slow, 19.6% of children aged 5-17 (about one in five) are engaged in automatic labor.

In June 2020, the United Nations announced that approximately 1 billion children (ages 2-17) worldwide are victims of physical or psychological violence. Since there are approximately 2.3 billion children under the age of 18 in the world, this means that approximately 43% of children have been exposed to violence. Unfortunately, about 40,000 children a year (2017) are victims of homicide.

To create and maintain a safe and peaceful environment for future generations, WFPW strives to educate and empower the children of today.

Mobile Library and Literacy Project in South Africa.

The Mamangwana Mobile Library Project began in 2022 to improve rural literacy among children by bringing books into their world. The project grew in popularity as youth attendance steadily increased throughout the year.

780 children between the ages of 6 and 12 were educated through the implementation of the Mobile Library and Literacy Project in South Africa.

Sustainable Training Platform in Nigeria.

WFP believes that a society which empowers its youth will not suffer severely from unemployment problems, which is an issue in society today. Skilled youth are job creators. WFP Nigeria has been providing a sustainable training platform that enables youth to learn how to sew clothes. The sewing skills learned empowers the youth to alleviate economic hardship by providing for themselves and their families.

From August to December, in the Yala, Local Government Area, and Cross River State, WFP Nigeria successfully trained **43 girls and 27 boys** to sew cloth.



“Lift Me Up” Education Assistance Fund and Refurbished Laptop Give-away in Malaysia.

WFP Malaysia hosted an educational grant program to help students from poor families cope with challenges and continue their tertiary education in college and university. In this era of information technology and virtual learning, computers serve as one of the most essential tools for gaining access to education. The “Lift Me Up” project seeks to source pre-loved laptops from willing donors and pass them on to needy college students after refurbishment.

During 2021-2022, **75% (12 out of 16)** of “Lift Me Up” grant recipients were able to continue their higher education after receiving their grant/ laptop.

Participants’ Voices:

“I have been doing all my college assignments with my smartphone, which my three younger siblings are also taking turns using for studies and homework. With the rising cost of living, my parents could not afford to provide a computer for us. The laptop will definitely make learning much more convenient and easier for all of us. Thank you so much, WFP! It certainly helped me pursue my dream of becoming a teacher. I want to pay this kindness forward to others when I become successful in the future.”

Moral Education for Youth in Russia.

Throughout the year, WFPW Russia gave lectures on moral education both offline and online in schools. The main topics were “Love and Sexuality” and “Consequences of Using Bad Words.”



More than **800** school children and **500** parents participated in the moral education lectures.



Education on the Reunification of Korean Peninsula for the Youth in Korea.



1,261 youth were empowered and educated through the two literature programs, two camps, and one book talk concert on the theme of sustainable peace and the realization of reunification on the Korean peninsula.

Participants’ Voices:

“Until now, the idea of reunification felt too far away, but as I visit directly the area where the war took place, I sincerely wish for the quick realization of reunification. When I saw the monument with the names of those who participated in the war, my head naturally bowed without realizing it. I don’t want this kind of pain and suffering to happen anymore. I hope many people in their teens and 20s will have an earnest desire for the reunification of the two Koreas, and these kinds of programs should be held more.”



Big Dream (Kun Kkum) Project for Cambodian Children.

WFPW Korea raised funds to build a library so that Cambodian children can receive an education and develop big dreams for the future.

Through the two libraries built in Cambodia, **1,300** students will use the library for the first time in their lives.

WFPW Korea Scholarship Program.

The scholarship total of 45,000,000 won was given out to **49** students, both national and international students who are studying in Korea, to support their higher education to become future peacemakers.

Schools of Africa National Fundraiser in the USA.

WFPW USA is continuing its annual contributions to the Schools of Africa Project! “Shine Africa: The Power of Education” was the theme of the national Schools of Africa fundraiser held virtually in August. An exciting auction was then held where viewers were able to purchase the auctioning items which were donated. As the auction was happening, donations were being given.

WFPW USA raised US\$ **8,151** for children in Africa.



Teaching Literacy and Character Education for Disadvantaged Children in Jordan.

WFP Jordan representatives were recently the recipients of a cooperative project funded by the Italian Agency for Development Cooperation (ICO) and organized by Cooperazione Internazionale (COOPI), an Italian NGO, and the Noor Al Hussein Foundation, a local NGO chaired by Queen Noor of Jordan. With COOPI focusing on character education and the Noor Al Hussein Foundation focusing on academic education, the joint project aimed to serve children living in impoverished areas of Jordan and took place at WFP Jordan's garden.

Participants' Voices:

One 15-year-old girl who had never gone to school could not read or write Arabic. However, she wanted to try to make a presentation and she did. She had been so nervous but when she was done, she became extremely happy as she had never made such an achievement before and so for her, it was such a special experience.

Foster Children Program in Kratie.

WFP Cambodia has a foster children program in three provinces: Takeo, Prey Veng and Kratie. This time WFP visited Kratie, the commune where 37 foster children live, crossing the Mekong River. Support money was donated to foster children during the local event.

More than **400** residents gathered, including the Deputy Minister, senior officials from the Ministry of Civil Service (to which WFP Cambodia has an MoU) and the district governor, who also delivered a speech at the event.

UN Geneva and Youth.

Reached **200+** youth through programs such as Youth training on UN Advocacy, Curriculum training, Human Rights Internship Program, Youth Peace Conference and the Youth Conference for UN CSW.

Through the NGO CSW Global Youth Conference with the main leadership of WFWPI, we were able to prepare and engage nearly 150 young people for the UN CSW 2022.

Human Rights Internship Program in UN Geneva.

This internship program hosts international interns who began their journey with WFWP researching and advocating various human rights issues. The interns are asked to write individual advocacy papers on their choice of interest within the umbrella of human rights and women's rights. This year, the interns did a remarkable job in completing their papers on different topics in just two months.

Engaged in advocacy at the UN on serious Human Rights concerns in countries such as Nigeria, Lebanon, Jordan, the UK, Canada and many more through the youth interns who researched and published advocacy journals.

At the end of the two-month period of internship, the Human Rights Forum was hosted, showcasing and presenting interns' research to global civil society activists.



Art and Metaverse in WFWP.

WFWP IHQ hosted its 3rd "Color My Heart with Peace" international children's art contest gathering 232 artworks from 24 nations in 10 regions. The applications supported the theme of "Peace and Unification in North and South Korea."

WFWPI also implemented art in Zepeto, a metaverse virtual space playground, to attract more young people to promote WFWP's vision of peace and reunification on the Korean peninsula.

Young Leaders Retreat in NY.

After a two year hiatus of in-person gatherings, the WFWPI Office for UN Relations in New York held an international Young Leaders Retreat in Barrytown, New York, from August 4 to 8. The purpose of the retreat was to create a space in which young socially minded women come together to discover and commit their passions for the sake of world peace, centered on WFWPI's feminine leadership paradigm, under the theme of "Spread Your Wings: Using Your Gift to Transform the World." A total of 15 young women from 11 different countries traveled across the world to participate in this impactful program. Over the course of four days, the participants learned about the WFWPI Co-founders and their vision for women leadership and world peace, discussed the real work of becoming women leaders this world needs and were empowered to start developing their own socially minded projects using their unique talents, passions and creativity. The women also connected with their hearts and with one another, surrounded by the serene environment of upstate New York, creating a deeply reflective and healing, as well as familial spirit. The retreat concluded with a bonus day visiting the UN Headquarters in NY. The women left the city connected to themselves and to one another, supported in their passions and inspired to contribute to their communities through their passions and skills.

Participants' Voices:

"The overall program was very nice. I was able to reflect on myself, which was really needed for me personally."

"I would like to do a short version of retreat content for the WFWP Colombian chapter and Dominican chapter. You guys changed me. I am very grateful so I want to share the blessings."

"The retreat was amazing. I hope that all the things we shared don't get lost with time but that our hopes and ideas grow from strength. We were well received and made to feel at home instead of being visitors. I'm grateful to the entire team that made this happen."

"Thank you so much for all your hard work for us. In my case, even though I am not sure of how to get out of my blockage, I definitely gained the motivation and the love to look for a way. And I feel confident in finding a way."



WFWPI Young Professionals Team Contributes to World Peace.

The Young Professionals Team is part of the WFWPI Global Committee, an international network of integrated and interrelated development committees to realize the vision of WFWPI. The Young Professionals Team is a creative think tank on the international level created to practice cultural diplomacy, which is the exchange of ideas, information, art, language and other cultural aspects between a nation and its people in order to deepen mutual understanding. This team brainstorms, develops and proposes suggestions and ideas for the goals and direction of the WFWP and contributes not only innovative ideas on environmental issues, IT-related education, social networking marketing and etc. but also engage young volunteers, interns and professionals to represent WFWP at the UN and contribute to research, position papers and statements.

About **400** young people around the world attended the webinar.





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
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

CLIMATE CHANGE ACTION

Overall global temperatures are rising, with the year 2020 marking the highest global average temperature ever recorded, and some predictions state that by 2100 the global average temperature will have risen by up to 3.2°C. This would increase the risk of natural disasters such as heat waves and droughts from rising sea levels, which would have a negative impact on the ecosystems of plants and animals, including humans, that live on Earth.

WFP works in the direction of educating people about the importance of preserving nature and making a difference for the greater vision, one step at a time, by taking action that is possible in each community, such as picking up trash, recycling clothing, providing solar lamps, planting trees and vegetables, etc.



Green Solar Energy for the African Villages in Kenya.

More than 600 million households in Africa are living without electricity, which is a large number of the population that does not have access to light when the sun goes down. WFP Africa has researched and identified the need to bring green solar energy to African villages, by donating solar lamps to empower rural women and teaching them new skills for self-sufficiency.

Since 2020, approximately **300** families have benefited from the project.

Hundreds of school children can now study past sunset in their homes and their mothers can cook and do household chores after dark.

Participants' Voices:

“We could never have imagined that there would be an organization that would be willing to travel to our far-flung village to provide us with what we needed most: light!”

“Dr. Hak Ja Han Moon is the MOTHER OF LIGHT!”

Permaculture Literacy Program in the Philippines.

Anchoring on the theme, Permaculture: The Linchpin to Food Security and Regenerative Healing of the Planet, the joint program initiated by WFP Philippines and 10,000 Heroes United, gathered the current president of a women’s association, a former town councilor, agricultural technologists, municipal agriculturists, teachers, youth volunteers and students. The program aimed to educate the participants, who are to become permaculture practitioners, on how nature works and on how to optimize its external forces for both humans and the planet to form a continuous, healthy and symbiotic relationship.

A total of **44** Boholano permaculture enthusiasts convened for a two-day Permaculture Literacy Program in March at the Center for Wisdom and Character Excellence Montesunting, Carmen.



Ecological Project in Armenia.

WWF Armenia, with the support of the Mayor of Razdan city, organized ecological projects to clean up forests and lakes.



Participants' Voices:

"I would like to see more projects like this held and would like to invite my friends."



Planting Trees in Burkina Faso.

Starting in 2021, WWF Burkina Faso launched the "Environmental Awareness and Call to Action" project to take action towards SDG 15.

About **550** fruit trees were planted in Burkina Faso.

Participant's voice:

"WWF did not just bring us a basket of fruits. They brought the whole tree!" said the Director of an orphanage that received some of the fruit trees.

Eco-Fest Youth for Environment in Albania.

WWF Albania helped raise awareness for the need to protect the environment among young people by organizing a concert of environmental messages by high school students and a contest of ideas on environmental protection.

About **120** people were reached in this campaign.



Nationwide Simultaneous Plogging and Volunteer Activities in Korea.

4,907 people from **206** cities participated in a nationwide simultaneous plogging and volunteer activities to help prevent environmental pollution from garbage that is thrown out on the streets.

Giving For Good Auction 2022.

Between July 17 and August 7, the WFWPI Office for UN Relations in NY held its second annual Giving For Good fundraising campaign centered on the theme: "Healing Our Home, Our Shared Calling." TRUE FAMILY VALUE EDUCATION

In April 2020, the Secretary General of the United Nations, António Guterres, issued a statement warning of increasing domestic violence worldwide. After the spread of the COVID-19 pandemic, while some people have spent more time at home and felt the importance of family, the number of people suffering from domestic violence has skyrocketed.

Domestic violence against wives and children by husbands who have lost their jobs or have become anxious and frustrated have increased around the world. Psychological violence that harms the mind, such as verbal abuse and bullying, is also a form of violence. The fact that many countries banned or restricted people from leaving their homes, leaving those suffering from domestic violence with nowhere to escape, also exacerbated the situation.

WFWP believes that happy women who are healed and empowered create happy families and homes, which leads to healthy communities and a peaceful world. WFWP organized activities and projects based on true family values to solve this serious issue, protect families from corruption and provide a platform for women and children to live in safety and peace.

WFWP International Educational Course: Heart's Intelligence and Role in Spiritual Life.

The virtual 12-session course aims to help participants overcome their personal traumas and memories of pain and provide tools to help them improve the lives of people around them, including family members, friends and co-workers.

This course helps the participants identify obstacles and challenges in their hearts, develop their relationships from the point of having healed, develop a new perspective on life, help others resolve their emotional pain, raise their frequency with simple exercises that can easily be taught to everyone in our family or workplace and understand the importance of resolving painful memories to solve the world's problems.

17 women in Africa were trained and qualified to travel to rural African villages without internet access to help heal families, especially women and children suffering from domestic violence.



130 people received the online course on the Heart's Intelligence and Role in Spiritual Life

"Strengthening Family Relationships as a Means of Crime Prevention: Role of Parents" in UN Vienna.

During the 2022 Commission on Crime Prevention and Criminal Justice, WFWP UN Vienna Office, in cooperation with the Royal Embassy of Cambodia in Brussels, Pasuguan NG Pilipinas in Vienna and Father-CON, organized a side event to promote family values.

An international call was made for "Comprehensive strategies for crime prevention towards social and economic development."



Foster Children Program in Kratie (WFP Cambodia).

WFP Cambodia has a foster children program in three provinces: Takeo, Prey Veng and Kratie. This time we visited Kratie, the commune where our 37 foster children live, crossing the Mekong River.

Support money is usually given to each child after activities like the above; however, this time there was a local event for the entire commune on the following day, and we handed out the support money to our foster children during that event. More than 400 residents gathered, including the Deputy Minister and senior officials from the Ministry of Civil Service, to which WFP Cambodia has an MoU, as well as the district governor also came to the event to deliver speeches. We are grateful that our foster children program was widely recognized on that occasion.

HEALTH AND MEDICAL SUPPORT

About 3.5 billion people, or half of the world's population of 7.8 billion, have no health insurance and no access to medical care. Even if they do have access to medical care, nearly 100 million people in the world struggle with the burden of high medical costs.

WFP works in the field of medical and health assistance, providing humanitarian aid and care to those in need.



GAZA iDream Funds for Children and Families in Need.

WFP Cyprus and Korea raised funds for the project that took place in the north-side village of the Gaza Strip, the most vulnerable area with only one clinic in the village that provides free prevention, treatment and management for micronutrient deficiency and vaccinations for children under the age of 5.

The donation of **USD 10,000** raised through the GAZA iDream was sent to support the Child Health Program organized by the Palestinian Medical Relief Society.

WFP Cyprus members matched a Japanese donation and sent **US\$2,050** to Gaza to purchase wheelchairs needed for injured people.

1% Love Share Project in Korea.

The 1% Love Share Project is a campaign initiated by the WFP Korea to help eradicate poverty by collecting donations that amount to just 1% of a donor's paycheck. With the donations, WFP seeks to help those less fortunate around the globe.

Through the 1% Love Share Project, 25 senior citizens who live alone in Seoul and need financial assistance received **200,000 won** each for their living expenses, and 100 senior citizens who live alone received 'hope kits' filled with food, daily supplies and masks to support their daily lives and to prevent COVID-19.

Distribution of Humanitarian Aid in Pakistan.

WFP Europe and Middle East distributed humanitarian aid, including food, mineral water, soaps, sanitary pads for families in Pakistan during the flood relief.



Breast Cancer Awareness Month Activities and Final “Pink October” Event in Latin America.

In September, WFP Latin America started a breast cancer awareness campaign called “Towards Pink October.” This campaign concluded in October with a virtual conference for all of Latin America, organized by WFP and the International Association of First Ladies for Peace from Latin America and the Caribbean. Several countries in Latin America joined this campaign and it opened many doors to introduce WFP to other NGOs, universities, hospitals and other institutions. Through this event, WFP Latin America was able to relate and empathize with many women who have experienced breast cancer and provide them with a network of support and care.

WFP Brazil started this campaign on a national level several years ago and this year, they expanded to other countries. They worked with several breast cancer awareness groups and NGOs. They made wigs, hats and many other items for breast cancer patients. In Peru, Argentina, Panama, Nicaragua and Venezuela, the volunteers went to parks and streets to distribute pamphlets about Pink October.

PEACE AND RECONCILIATION

Achieving the SDGs require that all people be free from violence of any kind and live their lives in peace, regardless of ethnicity or creed. Governments, civil society and communities must unite to reduce violence, achieve justice and fight corruption.

WFP works towards achieving peace and reconciliation in the world by bringing harmony to all families, communities and nations, based on the fundamental value of living for the sake of others.



Co-creating Spaces for Peace and Reconciliation on the Korean Peninsula. What Steps are Women Taking Towards Peace?

WFWP Europe hosted the webinar to expand on the proposal for a partnership for a special project. This project, in the context of Korean reunification, is to create a “women’s peace zone” at the Demilitarized Zone (DMZ) between North and South Korea.

Dr. Maria Cavaco Silva; Parliamentary President of the Organization for Security and Cooperation in Europe, Hon. GWPN International Mini-Talks by WFWP USA, Korea & Japan.

1st GWPN International Mini-Talk Show “A Unified Korea - Crash Landing on You” was attended by **640** people.

2nd GWPN International Webinar “DMZ Peace Park: Creating Bridges Toward a Unified Korea” was attended by **411** people.



Living Together in Peace: What Does it Take? (WFWP Middle East)

On June 9, 2022, the Women’s Federation for World Peace Middle East and Association for Equality and Citizenship (ANWAR), organized together a virtual event under the title: “Living Together in Peace- What Does it Take?”



An engaging session of questions and answers followed when participants shared their opinions, questions, and recommendations. The meeting came to a close with Mrs. Carolyn Handschin, Director of the WFWPI UN Offices and President of the UN NGO/CSW, highlighting each speaker’s important points. Mrs. Handschin stated that the government’s responsibility in securing people’s safety and freedom goes together with people’s responsibility towards life, love, peace, and growth. Women as leaders and mothers play an important role in passing a culture of peace to the next generation.

PARTNERSHIPS

“Leave no one behind” is the central, transformative promise of the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development and its SDGs.

WFP promotes an enhanced partnership approach that works with people, organizations, research institutions and others to identify local needs and act for the good of people and the world.



Melbourne Pasifika Festival.

The Melbourne Pasifika Festival is an annual activity organized by WFPW Australia to promote unity and respect among Australian island communities; introduce Pasifika culture, family ties, and spirituality to the wider Australian community; raise funds to support WFPW global development and aid projects in Pacific island countries; and promote Pacific island businesses through having stalls sell Pacific food and goods.



In 2022, over **700** people attended the event to support the Pacific Islands community.

Through the Melbourne Pasifika Festival, WFPW Australia was able to engage with 7 Pacific Island communities and work with Pacific Island community leaders to organize the festival.

Ukraine Side-by-side with Poland.

Initiation and success of the project in cooperation with the Polish Fund for Ukraine "Tratva" and the Kiev-Svyatosyn Center for Social and Psychological Rehabilitation of the Population.

More than **6000** people and **820** families received necessary help, including hygiene products, disinfectants, diapers for children and adults, diapers, mattresses, bed linen and blankets.

WFPW Ukraine bought warm winter shoes for **9** children, including children from large families, children with disabilities and children of deceased war veterans.

WFPW volunteers assisted **90** military personnel receiving treatment and rehabilitation at the Center for Mental Health and Rehabilitation of Veterans in Puscha Vodytsia.

Nearly **160** Polish and Ukrainian families participated in a cultural and educational meeting of the Japanese volunteers, titled "East Meets West" in honor of the International Day of Peace.

Japan donated a projector and screen to a hostel in Wroclaw where about 300 refugees from Ukraine live. Adults and children are able to watch movies and do useful activities together, creating a more family-like atmosphere.



WFWP Latino Chapter in the USA.

Mrs. Concha Marchitelli of Maryland launched the first “Cornerstone for Peace” WFWP seminar and thus also officially launched the first Latino chapter of WFWP USA. The seminar inspired all women present, and more than double than those who registered attended. The idea was to reach the Latino community with a platform that goes beyond religious denominations and promotes universal values, and to empower Latina women to use their God-given feminine aspect to strengthen their marriages, educate their families and communities. The event was very successful and ended with a “call to action” to raise funds to send Christmas gifts to an orphanage in the Dominican Republic.

WFWP USA had **3** curriculas translated into the Spanish Language with the assistance of the Latino online community: Leadership of the Heart - Cornerstone for Happiness - Cornerstone for Peace.



Chad Summer Camp turns to a Seminar on Character Education.

WFWP Chad organized a summer camp that took place in September at Lycee Feminine National High School in the capital of N'djamena. The goal was to teach 12 chapters of a character education curriculum to students who started the educational seminar in 2021.

WFWP Chad worked in partnership with the Ministry of Education. A total of **55** participants ranging from high school to university students, teachers, the Principal of the Lycee Feminine, representatives from the Ministry of Education, the Ministry of Youth, Sports and Entrepreneurship, a representative from a political party and the Vice Dean of the University of N'djamena participated.

HLPF 2022 Virtual Side Event.

The WFWPI Office for UN Relations in New York in collaboration with the World Council for Psychotherapy and the International Association of Applied Psychology, hosted a virtual Side Event during the UN High-Level Political Forum (HLPF) 2022, titled “Permaculture: A Universal, Hopeful Practice for Building Back Better.” The program featured perspectives from expert permaculture practitioners, community leaders, educators and government leaders. These special speakers engaged in a roundtable discussion, where they identified practical solutions and successful practices and encouraged the creation and implementation of policies that support resilience and partnerships toward the well-being of people and the healing of the planet.



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
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WFWPI AND SDGS

On September 25, 2015, more than 150 world leaders adopted the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development at the UN Sustainable Development Summit. The Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs), consisting of 17 goals and 169 targets, are the successor to the Millennium Development Goals (MDGs) that are implemented to be accomplished by 2030.

As a UN NGO, WFWPI is engaged in various activities to achieve the SDGs in its international and national projects and volunteer programs.

SDG 2 *Hydroponics Gardening Training in the Philippines.*

“Food on every table” is what the Philippine Government envisioned. But food sustainability is always a problem for many families in the Philippines. Learning hydroponics gardening is one way to alleviate this problem. In July, WFP Philippines conducted an event at the Mothers’ Hearts Network Office in Rodriguez, Rizal to teach members how to make their own hydroponic vegetables.



SDG 3 *Construction of Washroom Facilities for Children in Ghana.*

WFP Ghana built a washroom for students at Opah Basic School in the Greater Accra Region. In May, a ceremony was held to hand over the keys to the newly built washroom to the school authorities. Toiletries were also donated to the school to help keep this facility clean.

SDG 3 *Education on Well-Being and Health in Schools in São Tomé and Príncipe.*

WFP São Tomé and Príncipe conducted an education session at the Villa Fernanda School, on the outskirts of the country’s capital in May. The theme chosen for this session was “Body hygiene and underwear care.” WFP invited a nurse, who is the mother of two students who attended that school. When she found out about the WFP’s activity at her children’s school, she was very excited and expressed a desire to also collaborate with the initiative.



SDG 3 *Share kindness, Thai people never leave each other.*

In October, WFP Thailand in Ubon Ratchathani Province initiated “Khueang Nai activities of happy city.” More than 1,250 people participated in the activities, including local leaders of every sub-district in Khueang Nai District, teachers, doctors, nurses, the district health promoting hospital, village health volunteers, civil defense volunteers, Khueang Nai District Rescue Foundation, volunteer faculty, Thai dancers and villagers in 183 villages. One of the activities initiated was “Living for the greater good, Thai people never leave each other” which was aimed at helping flood victims in the Ubon Ratchathani Province. Volunteers offered food to a large group of monks as well as made connections and gave alms to the cultural road leading to alms, precepts and prayers. Participants were happy and refreshed as they packed survival bags to distribute together. The supplies included rice, snacks, milk, drinking water and other necessary items donated to flood victims in the flood-affected areas.



SDG 3 *Mindful Meditation Retreat in Australia.*

The retreat was hosted by WFP Australia and featured expert presenters who shared insights and their own experiences on healing, health and how to incorporate strategies and practices into their daily lives to relieve stress and promote a healthy lifestyle.

SDG 3 *“From Heart to Heart” Charity Concerts for the Elderly in Russia.*

WFP Russia held five charity concerts at homes for the elderly. This was to an effort to teach young children to live for others and to take care of the elderly. Children from several schools, including a kindergarten in Moscow and its suburbs, made beautiful celebration cards for the elderly for the New Year, International Women’s Day and Older Persons Day.



SDG 4 *“Be Your Child’s Best Friend” Parenting Workshop in Malaysia.*

The parenting workshop was jointly organized by WFP Malaysia, Pusat Wanita Berdaya and the Seri Setia New Village Community Management Council to provide positive parenting tips and effective communication skills between parents and children. 70 participants, including parents and children, attended the workshop together. Positive parent-child communication is a two-way street, which helps to cultivate a more loving and warm connection in the family. Therefore, it is a vital part of every healthy parent-child relationship. Participants were also given an interaction session within small groups where they could share their thoughts and opinions on the parenting workshop.



SDG 4 *Teachers for Peace Educational Course in Portugal.*

This course was created to develop a healthy brother-sister relationship between Africa and Europe. WFP Portugal works with Portuguese-speaking countries in Africa in the areas of education and gender equality to provide tools for education that enables healing and openness of the heart and promotes ethical values. The course ran from March 6 to November 19, once a week for about 2 hours each, with over 50 participants per week, mostly Mozambicans and there was a very high level of interest and action. According to the excellent testimonials collected from the trainees, the course was instrumental in achieving its goals.




SDG 4 *“Preventing Crime through Encouraging a Healthy and Sustainable Lifestyle for Young People – Best Practices” in UN Vienna.*

WFWP UN Vienna office hosted the forum as part of the 11th session of the Conference of the Parties to the UN Convention against Transnational Organized Crime hosted by the United Nations Office on Drugs and Crime. SDG 4 *WFWPI Educational Courses for Self-Development and Empowerment.*

WFWPI provides virtual, accessible education free of charge to people in need. WFWPI believes education is a very important factor to engagement and is beneficial to people everywhere. In 2022, WFWPI offered five versatile programs across a wide range of fields, including Financial Planning and Budgeting, Digital Art, NFT and NGO, SNS Marketing, Healing Therapy and Business Acceleration.



SDG 5 *GWPN Assembly and Leading into the Future Mentor Program in Australia.*

WFWP Australia created a transformational leadership forum for established and emerging leaders, with a focus on leadership of the heart. The Global Women Ambassadors for Peace Award was presented to several participants to recognize individual leadership, achievement and service for the benefit of others, standing on the common ground of universal moral principles, promoting reconciliation, overcoming barriers and building peaceful communities.


SDG 5 *Being a Girl Today: Difficulties and Opportunities.*

In October, WFWP Italy organized a conference in cooperation with the European Parliament office in Italy to celebrate the 30th anniversary of WFWP and the UN International Day of the Girl Child. The event was held in the prestigious Hall of Flags of the European Parliament in Italy. More than 60 people attended in person and 30 more attended virtually. Dott. Carlo Corazza, the head of the European Parliament office in Italy, said he was honored to host the WFWP event and welcomed the participants in their new building where they organize events for youth.



SDG 5 *Activate 2022 Leadership Training.*

The WFWPI Office for UN Relations in New York, in conjunction with Global Development Enterprise / NGO Academy, designed a 3-month virtual leadership training program which took place from August 19 - November 15, 2022. The project was managed by Musu Bakoto Sawo, an intern for the WFWPI Office for UN Relations in NY, who is currently pursuing an MA in Global Affairs at the University of Notre Dame. The aim was to equip WFWP leaders with a forward-looking approach to identify opportunities for growth, effectively implement and manage sustainable and impactful projects. A total of 10 participants from five countries joined the Activate 2022 Leadership Training. The coaches and lecturers of the program were Dr. Karen Smith, Director of Global Development Enterprise/ NGO Academy; Archt. Yani Dutta, Founder of The Regenes Project; and Mrs. Merly Barlaan, Director of the WFWPI Office for UN Relations in NY. The training culminated with a “Pitch Fest” in which participants presented their projects to a panel of judges. The top three winners were team Philippines: “Permaculture Education Program”; Mayor Junaflor Cerilles: “Learning Is Fun, not just for one but for every Juan”; and Ms. Tania Islam: “Interfaith Peace Village.” Special awards: “Most Impactful” went to team Philippines, “Most Innovative” went to Ms. Amber Le Fevre’s “Got Rights! Media” and “Most Successful” went to Mayor Junaflor Cerilles. The special award recipients received \$300 each.



SDG 5 UN Dream 2022.

This year, to commemorate the 77th Anniversary of when the UN Charter came into force and the 30th Anniversary of the founding of Women’s Federation for World Peace International (WFWPI), WFWPI UN Relations Office in New York and WFWP Africa co-organized a Virtual Forum on the theme of child brides titled “The UN Dream: Creating an environment where girls can be girls, not brides.” The event was held on October 28. This forum was created to bring together various members of civil society to find impactful and sustainable solutions to address the problems of child marriage. Since violence against girls cannot be resolved without addressing the effects of climate change and other environmental crises, WFWPI strived to use this forum as a platform to discuss the importance of integrating the issue of child marriages into environmental adaptation initiatives. It was also our hope to recognize the achievements of young leaders who are inspiring transformation in their communities through championing issues of girls’ rights and the environment. The event engaged with over 300 views worldwide, with 178 registrations and 195 views on Youtube.



SDG 10 Funding Project for the Good of Community.

WFWPIHQ launched the Funding Project 2020 to help WFWP chapters develop projects that can make a difference in the lives of their communities and countries. The projects relate to women’s empowerment, climate action, youth leadership and true family values. To date, WFWPI has supported 40 outstanding projects in 27 countries.



SDG 11 Construction of Afghan Cultural Center in India.

For the last two years, WFWP Afghanistan has given scholarships to outstanding Afghan women for Sewing and Design classes so that after graduation, they can support themselves or their families. Based on this success, WFWP decided to expand this work through the Cultural Center and Library, a program that will include sewing classes, English classes, Character Education and Computer classes in the future. WFWP Afghanistan has also established a library for women to freely research their hobbies and interests in a safe and comfortable environment.



SDG 16 Intercultural and Interreligious Festival “Children are Angels of Peace.”

WFWP Russia held the annual festival where more than 300 children and families of different nationalities and religions gather to convey the importance of peace in the world to the next generation.



SDG 16 2022 DMZ Peace Zone Symposium in Korea.

The symposium was co-hosted twice in 2022 by WFWP Korea and the United Nations Association Republic of Korea with the sponsorship of the Ministry of Interior and Safety. The symposium held in June held a theme under “Establish International Organization and the DMZ: Building Sustainable Peace” and invited two experts who presented and discussed the topic. In September, the international symposium was held with the topic of “Sustainable Peace on the Korean Peninsula: A Case of Conflict Management in International Disputes and the DMZ” and invited three experts each from Korea, the USA and Europe who presented and discussed the topic. WFWP Korea and the UNAROK have reached the agreement to work in cooperation for the vision of utilizing DMZ as a peace zone and establishing the UN Office in the Korean Peninsula, by signing an MoU in 202. They have co-hosted five symposiums in five different areas throughout Korea in 2021.



SDG 16 2022 Unification Literature Book Talk Concert.

The Book Talk Concert was held at Sun Moon University on the theme of “Beyond the Korean Peninsula to the World.” During the first part of the event, Professor Nam gave a topic presentation based on the book “Which Korean.” Defecting from North Korea, Professor Nam shared about the reality and difficult issues that North Korean defectors face while trying to settle down in South Korea. For the second part of the event, three current students and one WFWP member joined the panel for a debate and discussion, centering on the book.

Participants’ Voices:

“North Korean defectors are people who came really hard at the risk of their lives, so I thought they have a much better life both physically and mentally if they come to South Korea. However, through this book talk concert, I learned that their lives in South Korea are much more fiercer and starker than I thought. It is also shocking that social awareness is still harsh on them. We need to be educated and improve our minds through these kinds of educational programs.”



SDG 16 27th Women's Conference for Peace in the Middle East.

In October, WFWP Middle East hosted the MEW conference, where 66 registered participants joined. 73 senior WFWP ME members received the Global Peace Ambassador Award on the occasion of the 30th Anniversary of WFWP. Among the awardees, 30 people responded with gratitude letters, renewing their commitment to work together with WFWP.

Participants' Voices:

Former First Lady, Mme. Elsie Christofia, congratulated WFWP's important work for peace "I am proud to be part of this effort."



SDG 16 WFWP New Jersey Raises Flag at Clifton City Hall.

Nearly 40 people from all over the state came to watch WFWP New Jersey raise their flag at the Clifton City Hall on August 20. Attendees included the Mayor of Clifton, James Anzaldi, three Council members of Clifton, NJ, one member of the Board of Education for Clifton and several other public officials who were inspired to attend after seeing our WFWP USA event on the city's calendar.



SDG 16 Bridge Of Peace in Arizona - GWPN - Local TV coverage by CBS TV channels 3 & 5.

GWPN of Arizona expanded its network of professional women under the banner of peace by holding the "Bridge of Peace" ceremony. The ceremony was held with each pair of women bowing to one another as a symbol of repentance and forgiveness, followed by an exchange of scarves and flags, symbolizing a peaceful effort among countries (e.g., Russia and Ukraine; North Korea and South Korea) to one day come together. WFWP Arizona had reached out to several local TV stations, and two (one from Fox news and the other one from CBS) responded and sent their cameraman to film the BOP ceremony and to also interview President Mrs. Angelika Selle. That evening, the local CBS TV news aired a clip of the ceremony.



SDG 16 Youth Peace Conference in UN Geneva.

The WFWPI Office for UN Relations in Geneva hosted the Youth Peace Accord with a focus on “Peace in the Korean Peninsula,” with young people from Korea and all over the world. The participants delegated as world leaders and achieved a successful peace agreement and unification plan. 100 international young leaders of peace gathered online to discuss the topics of reconciliation and peace-building measures.



SDG 17 Faith Stories in Australia.

“Faith Stories” promotes community connectedness by bringing multicultural women faith leaders together to share a deeper understanding of their faith and culture, thereby breaking down barriers and stereotypes that prevent community cohesion. This event is not about doctrine, but about sharing faith stories.


SDG 17 GWPN, National HerStory Award Ceremonies in the USA.

In October, WFWP USA held the last National HerStory Award ceremony of the year. The HerStory awardees represented various backgrounds but the common denominator among them was that despite life's insurmountable challenges, they chose to look at the bright side of things and inspire others. The program included an introductory video that highlighted the founding of WFWP and the Global Women's Peace Network (GWPN) as well as its Co-founders and the activities the organization has done. In the year 2022, WFWP USA was able to honor 30 HerStory awardees.



SDG 17 *WFWPI Global Committee Gathers Women Leaders, Members and Friends on One Platform.*

The WFWPI Global Committee is an international network of three key integrated and interrelated development committees for education, humanitarian activities and young professionals, to implement the WFWPI vision of women working together to realize one global family rooted in the culture of sustainable peace. It is a platform for WFWPI leaders, members, supporters and friends to get involved in a particular area of focus or interest. Global Committee members serve on committees on a voluntary basis and actively work to advise WFWPI leadership and members on the latest trends, developments and best practices by contributing knowledge and skills.



SDG 17 *UN Advocacy Training and UN Social Forum Geneva.*

This workshop aims to build capacity and provide opportunities for young people in the spaces for UN Advocacy with a specific focus on Women's Rights. The workshop was held parallel to the UN Social Forum 2022 in November. It covered topics such as introduction to advocacy at the UN, the role of youth and their leadership at the UN, obstacles for youth leadership, personal development and public speaking, negotiation and mediation as well as strategy building. The agenda involved the participation of the youth in the Social Forum at the UNOG, meeting with officials from UN Women, OHCHR and etc.



WFWP COVID-19 RESPONSE

The COVID-19 pandemic has resulted in dramatic loss of life worldwide and poses unprecedented challenges to public health, world of work and education, economy and society.

Throughout the crisis, WFWPI continued to work to support families around the world, especially women and children, ensuring that help and care were available during and after the pandemic.

WFWP Burkina Faso

WFWP Burkina Faso, in collaboration with IAYSP, conducted a campaign against COVID-19 in the Zongo district, Ouagadougou. During this activity, face masks (450) and liquid soap (330 cans) were distributed to about 300 households in the district. The campaign also raised awareness to respect COVID-19 guidelines to ensure safety.

WFWP Kenya

WFWP Kenya volunteers initiated a project to make hand wash soaps and face masks, in addition to kickstarting a food distribution program for poor families in slum areas.

The chapter also took initiative to reduce the number of increased gender-based violence through conducting healing sessions with a psychiatrist. Many families experienced hardships leading to mental stress and depression, which in turn increased gender-based violence. The psychologist provided free counseling and guidance to needy families.



WFWP Nigeria

During the peak of the COVID-19 pandemic, WFWP Nigeria considered ways to help make women and children feel at peace in their homes. Soap making was an activity WFWP indicated an interest in and began in July.



WFWP Korea

WFWP Korea created 100 hope kits consisting of food, daily supplies and masks to support daily living and help prevent COVID-19 for 100 senior citizens who live alone in Seoul.



WFWP CELEBRATING ITS 30TH ANNIVERSARY

The traditional symbol for the 30th anniversary is the pearl, a symbol of beauty that is cultivated over time; the unity and love represented by 30 years shows commitment, patience, compromise and wisdom.

Founded in 1992 in the Republic of Korea, WFWP is a women's non-governmental organization that has General Consultative Status with the Economic and Social Council of the United Nations. WFWP has more than 120 chapters worldwide, united globally to promote women as essential partners in creating a peaceful global society, addressing unique issues and barriers in each region on the grassroots level and through high-level events.

WFWP International “30 Years A Remarkable Journey”

WFWPI hosted the virtual 30th Anniversary Celebration in May. The program consisted of the official celebration, the friendly awards and the appreciation event, along with important announcements. The program was open to the public, with nearly 3000 people worldwide joining live via Zoom and YouTube platforms.



WFWP USA “RADIATE - Honoring the Past - Celebrating the Present - Building the Future”

On October 22, WFWP USA celebrated a historical milestone. The 30th anniversary since its founding, its 25th anniversary as an NGO with General Consultative Status with the UN ECOSOC, as well as the 10th anniversary of Global Women Peace Network (GWPN). The Celebration was virtual, with over 400 participants from the USA, Canada, Europe, the Middle East and beyond. They all gathered to celebrate 30 years of WFWP’s radiance and to honor all the many volunteers, members, supporters, friends and the meaningful projects done over the years to empower women and create a more peaceful world.



WFWP Canada “Let’s Shine! Illuminate the Future!”

WFWP Canada held its 30th Anniversary Celebration on November 5, at the Canadiana restaurant in Etobicoke. There were 120 people in attendance. Member of Parliament Etobicoke, Hon. James Maloney and Member of Parliament Mississauga-Erin Mills, Hon. Iqra Khalid were in attendance and offered their congratulations with a token of their appreciation in the form of a certificate of commemoration. They were both given the WFWP 30th Anniversary Book as a token of appreciation.



WFWP Cameroon Celebrates 30!


On October 27, WFWP Cameroon celebrated its 30th anniversary in Tombel. The event began with an address by the Mayor of Tombel, followed by the singing of the National Anthem and the Song of Peace. WFWPI 30TH ANNIVERSARY BOOK

The WFWPI 30th Anniversary Book publication project began with a small spark of ideas and grew into a great flame of creativity and teamwork, uniting women of various nations and cultures around the single belief of realizing “One Global Family” taught by our WFWP Co-founders. The book contains the life stories of WFWP leaders and members, contents of WFWP activities, stories from around the world, as well as interviews with people who are or have been a part of the WFWP family. The editorial team made up of volunteers, were recruited in September 2021 and the fundraising for book publication costs began shortly thereafter. The book was produced using FSC A000523 paper and soy ink to address environmental awareness.



INSPIRING TESTIMONIALS AND SUCCESS STORIES

My Testimony as a Member of the WFWPI Global Committee

My name is Jacqueline Aber Sou. I am a member of WFWP Burkina Faso. In 2021, I became a member of the WFWPI Global Committee. I have had many experiences as a member of the Committee, some of which benefited my country Burkina Faso directly and indirectly. It is my honor to share some of these experiences with you.

Meeting New People

COVID-19 paved a new way for people around the globe to interact. Online meetings such as Zoom meetings were growing and permitted people from different parts of the world to meet virtually and share ideas, experiences, concerns, best practices and even grievances. WFWPI took this to another level by allowing us to overcome some of our barriers, such as structural barriers and opened the way for leaders, members and concerned individuals to come together as we forge the future ahead. I was able to meet virtually with many people from all over the world and even had the chance to exchange conversations with some of them during the breakout sessions at WFWPI-organized activities.

The Global Committees

There are two committees; the Education Committee and the Humanitarian

Committee, that look into ways to educate ourselves and the public on various domains. There is also a Young Professionals Committee, which brings together young people to share their experiences and contributions and how to impact the world during these rapidly changing times.

From these committees germinated some of the WFWPI educational programs such as The Heart's Intelligence and Role in Spiritual Life by Dr. Isabel Costa, Financial Planning and Budgeting by Dr. Jennifer Huang, Special Educational Sessions by Mrs. Elina Razena and many more Virtual Cafes with different themes.

The impact of these educational sessions can be realized on the individual levels as well as organizational levels. As an organization, WFWP-Burkina Faso was able to improve its activities due to the ideas and resources acquired from this committee. When WFWPI decided to focus on education in 2022, WFWP Burkina Faso decided to follow suit. We researched our community and realized that girls in our country were dropping out of school due to undesired pregnancies, lack of vision and clear dreams as they went to school. We decided to build a project called the "Girl Child Empowerment Project." This project was empowered and supported by WFWPI as part of our education program.

Another way WFWP Burkina Faso benefits from WFWPI programs is through the sharing of best practices with other WFWP Chapters. Before, we used to carry out stand-alone activities, that is, one-time activities that we did without follow-ups. However, using some ideas that were shared from the different international interactions, we have started aligning and mapping our activities to specific objectives with measurable outcomes.

This is still a work in progress and it will take us some time to come up with such kinds of plans and concrete projects. WFWP Burkina Faso is currently planning objectives related to four major areas of operations:

1. Strengthening the Family
2. Empowering the Girl Child
3. Environmental Protection
4. Mothers' Heart Network

Additional Benefits from the Global Committees and WFWPI Activities

Personally, I learned a lot from WFWPI activities. I attended a majority of the educational programs and virtual cafes that helped me learn a lot about the Korean peninsula.

I also gained deeper understanding about crowdfunding which I tried to implement with a school that cares for orphans. Although this did not work out for the school, I still learned a lot from the process itself. I had the chance to attend many international webinars, some related to the UN's global goals.

I was also a moderator for the Young Professionals webinar on "The Role of Youth in Family and Society." This was a role I was playing for the first time.

I believe it is a wonderful idea to expand this platform for sharing ideas and best practices around the world and where possible, provide translations in other common languages like French, Spanish and Portuguese.

Lighting a Spark for the Love of Reading: Mmangwana (Mother and Child) Literacy Project in South Africa

"Education is the most powerful weapon which you can use to change the world." These are the words of Nelson Mandela, a South African icon who led all citizens of the nation to have equal opportunities no matter their race, color or beliefs. Due to the Apartheid system in the past, South Africa suffers from a huge discrepancy between the rich and the poor. Indeed, one way to close this gap is through education

My name is Florida Ledwaba and I am the Regional Secretary General of WFWP Africa. My passion for education has led me to the Mmangwana Literacy Project. WFWP South Africa used the opportunity given to us through the funding grant from WFWPI to begin a Literacy project. The goal is to help children create a habit of reading with comprehension by providing them with skills and tools necessary for knowledge acquisition that they will need throughout their academic lives and even go further to develop interest and enjoy reading as a hobby and leisure activity. At first, we did not have any contacts with schools but we were determined to do it even on the street. From its launch in March 2022, every community and school we went to, to implement the project welcomed and supported us.

The comments of some of the participants below show how much they enjoy and love the program:

- Lethabo, 7 y.o.: "We learn many things; I enjoy coloring, reading and writing, and we also get lunch. I am happy to be part of the group."
- Bontle, 10 y.o.: "I like the program because it brings different children who speak different languages, and it teaches me to be kind. We had lots of fun. I enjoy reading and listening to storytelling. THANK YOU!!!"
- Thapelo, 7 y.o.: "I am happy to be part of Mmangwana Library. It is good for the children."

Mr. E. Khanyi, the School Governing Body Chairperson, spoke on behalf of the project: "As a governing body of Moses Kotane Primary School, we really appreciate your effort in assisting our children in reading and other academic activities you did in our school. Mmangwana Project was working well with us

throughout the year (2022) by assisting foundation phase pupils in reading. They have managed to produce good results at the end of the year 2022. In our last meeting with Mmangwana Project, they raised some concerns based on transport and catering costs, as a school, we wish these issues to be resolved as soon as possible. We will be waiting to continue to work with them this year, 2023, and this time we will include grade 6 and 7 pupils. Thank You.”

The youth volunteers gained valuable experiences as well. This is what they said:

- Misung Ledwaba: “The Literacy Project was a new experience for me. To be able to show the children the joys of reading and to see the excitement in their eyes as they heard stories were encouraging. My hope is that we have been able to encourage them to enjoy reading and improve their language skills and study hard in school. “
- Ryeojin Kuse: “As children in the township are not as privileged in terms of resources as children from the suburbs, Mmangwana Library was able to give them that. The children were really enthusiastic and eager to learn. I am happy to be part of this initiative.”
- Nam-Yong Ledwaba: “I was happy to join the Mobile Library project. It was a learning experience for the children as well as the volunteers. As we all gathered together during the session, it created a community. The mobile library was a safe, fun place to learn the literacy skills they need in life.”

Some women volunteers expressed their enthusiasm and joy in the program:

- Ms. Gloria Saraiva: “I once participated in the program as a volunteer in its initial stage and I could see the children’s quench for knowledge. They were there with enthusiasm, full of energy in numbers to grab an opportunity to learn. By using lots of creativity and energy the volunteers gave their best to stimulate interest and create a light-spirited joyful environment for the Children. Many times, attendance highly superseded the limit. It was very fulfilling to be with children and interact with them and see how WFWP Ladies worked in harmony with a couple of teachers who came to participate from the School staff.”
- Nobabtu Khumalo: “Mmangwana has been of great help to the children and the community at large, it has helped many, if not almost all the children in Siyabonga block not only with their academic performance but with confidence as well. As a volunteer at Mmangwana, I am happy to assist with the preparation of food for the


children, cleaning the center we use, washing the dishes, etc.”

With the growth of the program, needs also arise, like the need for more human and material resources. There is a lot more that needs to be done. In conclusion, it is very gratifying to know that with those actions today, we are shaping these children’s future by providing them with learning support and by allowing them to experience interacting with the international world represented by WFWP volunteers who come from different backgrounds and countries.

2022 WFWP IHQ KOREA EXPENSES









Afghanistan | WFWP Afghanistan Cultural Center Library

WFWP Afghanistan, with the support of WFWP International and WFWP Japan, opened the WFWP Afghan Cultural Center and Library for forgotten Afghan girls, now living in New Delhi as refugees. In between classes, the girls enjoy reading and talking in the library located in the next room. New visitors began coming to the center because they heard rumors about the students attending the center. The news spread quickly by word of mouth in the Afghan community, so WFWP will continue to improve the library environment and provide good classes.



Participants' Voices:

"I live in the neighborhood, but I never go to my friends' houses to visit. It is very valuable to be able to talk with everyone here."

Argentina | GUARDIANES DEL AMBIENTE (Environmental Guardians)

WFWP Argentina, together with the NGO "Chacras de Buenos Aires," brought together a group of women who were educated on how to create and manage organic vegetable gardens for families in need. The women received preliminary education on recycling and composting preparation and helped sow the vegetables for the organic vegetable garden.



Australia | GWPN Assembly

WFWP Australia hosted the Global Women Peace Network, the Mentor Program and the launch of the Global Women Peace Ambassador Award. Through this event, WFWP Australia was able to network with new women leaders and professionals and developed a large database for GWPN women leaders - Global Friends and Global Partners. They also created a WFWP Australia LinkedIn page.

Brazil | Heavenly Community Heavenly Environment

The Heavenly Community Heavenly Environment Project, in collaboration with the Municipality of Osasco and the Secretary of the Environment and WFWP Brazil, had rehabilitated and adopted abandoned squares within impoverished areas in 27 states in Brazil, mainly in the state of São Paulo. The project aimed to create a peaceful environment by spreading awareness to local communities about environmental conservation and care. WFWP also gave lectures at schools to raise awareness on environmental conservation. This activity included an essay contest on the environment, with prizes awarded for the best essays.



Burkina Faso | The Girl Child Empowerment Project in Burkina Faso

WFWP Burkina Faso organized a workshop in Lycée Bogodogo with students from the Ouagadougou International School in six different cities and schools. Each workshop was attended by 50 to 250 children. The educational curriculum included topics such as self-esteem, the four realms of heart and moral education. School officials welcomed the project and saw it as a resource to support the youth, especially young girls, with their education. Through this project, 942 young people, mostly girls, were educated this school year.



Cote d'Ivoire | Autonomous Women for Peace

WFWP Côte d'Ivoire, with the support of the Côte d'Ivoire State, has implemented this project, which has enabled 15 disadvantaged women to become self-reliant. The certificates obtained after the training are recognized by the Côte d'Ivoire State, and with their knowledge and know-how, each of these women were able to offer their services for a fee. Furthermore, the recipes they learned are very popular in Côte d'Ivoire, and the kitchen tools they received after completing the class greatly contributed to their first steps toward self-sufficiency.



DR Congo | Management of Household Waste Through the Distribution of Plastic Bags in Five Quarters of the Commune of Ngaliema

WFWP DR Congo authorized the implementation of the project at the Ngaliema Environmental Authority. Project volunteers visited different households in the Ngaliema area and educated them on the importance of recycling and how to separate trash at home. Participants began to use plastic bags instead of throwing trash everywhere and even began to separate their trash.



Haiti | Vocational Training Sewing Class

WFPW Haiti held sewing classes for women and men who want to become self-sufficient and help empower their community. The classes were divided by morning and afternoon sessions, with 12 students in each class and a total of 24 participants. Those who mastered the skills were able to start their own businesses and sew uniforms for students. In areas without electricity, students were also able to learn how to use a foot-pedal sewing machine, which does not require electricity.



Participants' Voices:

"I am really happy to be able to sew my own clothes and children's clothes by myself."

"Learning the technique gave me a lot of confidence. In the future, I will continue to sew as a job."

Kenya | Green Solar Energy for African Villages

This project, organized by WFPW Kenya, benefited over 100 families in Kitui who were given solar lamps. These families were able to stop using kerosene lanterns, which were particularly harmful to their health. The project achieved its goal of changing lives and giving the beneficiaries hope for a better life and health.



Malaysia | "Lift Me Up" Youth Empowerment Programme

WFPW Malaysia, in cooperation with the Association for Community Development and Education of Kuala Langkat District (PPPM), hosted the "Lift Me Up" Education Assistance Fund and Refurbished Laptop Giveaway in Banting, Selangor. The event was held at the Seri Maha Mariamman Hall and attracted 35 participants consisting of youth, students and parents. Under WFPW's Education Empowerment Initiative, 10 outstanding university students from underprivileged families were selected as beneficiaries. Eight students received refurbished laptops and two others received grants. Initially, only five refurbished laptops purchased with the grant money were to be given. However, a generous donor, inspired by WFPW's vision for this educational outreach initiative, donated an additional seven refurbished laptops, allowing us to give 12 laptops to deserving students. An article about the project was published in a popular local Tamil-language newspaper. The laptop recipients not only received laptops for their studies but also received valuable education to become young people of good character with a sense of public spirit and service to society.



South Africa | Mmangwana Mobile Library

WFP South Africa has been able to obtain partnerships with local school governing bodies to give education through the Mobile Library project. These partnerships have the potential to be long-term. For children who regularly attend sessions, this project helps to fill the learning gaps created by the COVID-19 pandemic. WFP South Africa is creating a solid foundation for the establishment of permanent learning centers in these communities.



Taiwan | 2022 Empowerment for Young Women Leadership- Become International Leaders by Educating and Empowering Young Women

WFP Taiwan held an empowerment session for 20 young women leaders to: raise awareness on environmental and educational issues, increase young women's influence in their communities and become young leaders with an international perspective. Through the project, WFP helped: promote and strengthen the international participation of young women in Taiwan; select outstanding young women to participate in parallel events of the UN CSW, NGOs and various WFP international conferences; build a network for young women in Taiwan to connect with women around the world on women's issues; and provide participants with opportunities for knowledge building, networking and best practices.

Participants' Voices:

"A good leader is humble and soft with gratitude. Never be afraid to express yourself, but don't just do it. Good leaders make sure everyone is looking at the same thing. That's an art. A lot of gains! All the teachers share with us their abilities and charm accumulated through continuous attempts in life. Thanks for providing this platform, my 35 can be so wonderful!"

"Etiquette is not only about form, but also about dealing with people. Treating each other with courtesy, communicating with each other with enthusiasm and serving others, making people around you feel comfortable and caring for others, and making yourself more beautiful and attractive, are also important skills for interpersonal communication, interaction and coordination."


"The topic of gender equality involves multiple aspects, such as family, relationships and the workplace. It is broad and profound, and every woman will face the issue. I can also feel women's desire for gender equality from sister podcasts. We are all in the same boat, working for women's rights from different angles and perspectives. What kind of leader is a 'good' leader? I think it may be based on the good and common good of the community, exerting positive influence, listening to the team and external voices, guiding and driving the strategic direction, and growing together with the team. Leadership may not necessarily be the workplace or family, life is also. In the two-stage course, I also saw many shortcomings and areas for improvement in the process of learning with outstanding sisters from all walks of life. I also expected myself to keep improving, encourage myself to think positively, continue learning, shine, make achievements and help society."

UN Geneva | Youth Peace Conference - Korean Peace Accord

WFP Office for UN Relations in Geneva organized the WFP Youth Peace Conference - Korean Peace Accord with various special sessions during the conference. This included interactive sessions with experts on the issues of concern, diplomacy, peacebuilding measures and etc. The project empowered youth in peace leadership, where they mediated a successful peace agreement for the conflict in Korea. It was decided to recreate this conference annually with a different conflict each year. What is being considered is focusing on the conflict in Ukraine in August, 2023. The outcome document is alive and has been disseminated to many governments, UN bodies and other civil society networks.



USD 1,125 PROJECT

Thailand | Youth Leadership Volunteering Spirit in Youth

WFP Thailand coordinated activities and projects with high schools and recruited students. WFP conducted one-day youth education programs in 15 schools with a total of 320 students, learning about volunteering and becoming good citizens who are filial to their parents, families and country. Students received education on leading a life with strong morals, abstaining from drugs and consequential behavior. Many students were interested in membership relationships and volunteering.



USD 1,036 PROJECT

Honduras | Old Cloth Stays Home

WFP Honduras purchased a sewing machine to teach women how to reuse and recycle their old clothes. WFP Honduras was able to introduce this project to women who later became members of the organization. WFP was able to show them how important it is to reuse clothing to protect the environment.
